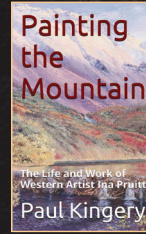
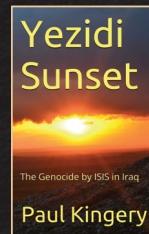
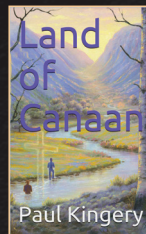

The return to Nineveh

On the 3rd August 2014, ISIS attacked the Region of Sinjar in Northern Iraq. This area was home to the Yezidi people; a distinct ethnic group. There had previously been 74 Genocide attempts on the Yezidi people.

During the 11 day attack over 5,000 young girls were taken as sex slaves, 10,000 Yezidis were killed or kidnapped and tens of thousands fled to the mountains leaving everything they owned.

Some Yezidis made their way to Syria, some to Germany, some to Turkey and some to the Dohuk Region of Kurdistan, Iraq.



Dr Paul Kingery

Dr. Paul Kingery grew up in Oregon USA. He comes from a strong Christian family and attended Bible College in Florida.

In his early twenties, God called Dr. Paul to Africa to work amongst the Zulu tribes. After this time, he then returned to America where he completed 3 masters' degrees in 'Care for the Basic Needs of People In Developing Countries'. He also earned a doctoral degree and became a University Dean. During this time Dr. Paul again asked the Lord if he could serve in foreign fields. This time the Lord sent him to Iraq.



Dr. Paul has now been living in Iraq for 10 years. During this time he has been a lecturer and an advisor to the government.

Nearly 4 years ago Dr. Paul felt the Lord call him to a small Christian village called Seje, a few miles outside the city of Dohuk. This was a very dangerous time in Iraq as ISIS were at the height of their invasion, but as everyone else was fleeing the country, Dr. Paul stayed.

Within weeks of him arriving to live in Seje, the displaced Yezidi people started arriving over the mountains.

the village life

There are currently 7,000 people living in Seje village, this a mixture of Christian and Yezidi families.

During the last 3 years, Dr. Paul and various volunteers have provided sanitization facilities and water tanks for each home in the village. There can be up to 20 people living in each house.

A safe house has also been built for the Yezidi girls who have returned from captivity, some who now have babies from ISIS terrorist fathers. The Yezidi people reject any babies that return with the girls. The residential safe house has recently opened and can house 28 women/girls/babies. Here the girls receive love and support from a team of ladies who will help the girls integrate back into society. They will be taught living skills, but most importantly they will be told and shown how special they are in God's eyes.

A bunker is in the process of being built at the back of the compound. This will be a medical and dental clinic.

Dr. Paul where possible employs locals from the village to help with all of the building and labor.

With financial support, Dr. Paul has managed to run food banks on several occasions for the whole village. However this is solely dependent on the generosity of people like you. The money received also goes towards helping to operate the safe house and building the medical clinic.
